## STOPPING DISTANCE IN ICE AND SNOW:

Thinking distance
Braking distance

Snow & ice	15m + 380m = <b>395m</b> 15m + 38m = <b>53m</b>									
Normal										50 mph
Metres	0	50	100	150	200	250	300	350	400	)
Snow & ice	9m + 140m = <b>149m</b>									20 mmh
Normal	9m + 14m = 23m									30 mph

**Drive slower**, and allow much more space between you and the vehicle in front. At 30mph total stopping distance increases over 6 times to 149m. At 50mph the number rises to over 7 times more to 395m. (Chart courtesy of UK.gov, AA, and BBC.)

Thames Valley Police guidance during these icy mornings is a reminder and warning to not leave your car unattended while the engine is running. If running the engine to defrost the windows, please stay with your car.

#### WHAT TO DO AT A RED LIGHT AND AN EMERGENCY "BLUE LIGHT" VEHICLE NEEDS TO GET THROUGH?



Emergency vehicles have three exemptions in law: Speed Limits, Red Lights, and Keep Left signs. They are looking to make progress with the blue lights and siren, and asking to be let through. If possible, move over to somewhere safe and allow them past. There is **no need** to mount kerbs or verges, or make sudden moves. (Often, for example on a restricted width road, or the brow of a hill, or at bends, it is better to keep going and let them pass in a safe place.)

If at a red light and you can move aside, please do so. But, going through the red light is a road traffic offence. (Similarly, going through a red light and ending up in a collision could place liability on you.)

If they cannot make progress, they apply the principle of **"effective non-use**". The blue lights stay on, and the siren goes off. This is saying 'I'd like to come through when I can'. (Source: Operational Patrol Unit – Warwickshire police)

#### KNOW YOUR CAR DASHBOARD WARNING SIGNS:



## **GREEN**; the system is working correctly, or is currently in use.

YELLOW; something is not working correctly. Take extra care and CHECK HANDBOOK as soon as it is safe to do so. RED; denotes a serious and potentially dangerous problem. Stop driving as soon as it is safe to do so. CHECK HANDBOOK, call for assistance. If on ignition start up the red light does not go out do not attempt to drive off.


## IAM RoadSmart WELCOMES GOVERNMENT (£1.6 billion) INVESTMENT IN ROADS:
